Two examples of practices by Efus member cities

- The region of Brussels-Capital (Belgium) supports the non-profit association <u>Transit</u>, which cares for adults suffering from addiction (drugs, alcohol, medicines) through a range of services, including a safe consumption room called Gate, the provision of sterile material, supervised housing, prison work, and a space for women.
 - >> Laurent Maisse, Deputy Director of Transit, will speak in the thematic session on drugs and harm reduction, on Wednesday 20 March, 16:15-17:45 >> Several visits on harm reduction schemes in the Brussels Capital Region will be organised during the conference (limited number of participants, first come, first served)
- The city of Loos (France) took part along two other French cities (Lille and Sarcelles) in a wide-ranging pilot programme aimed at preventing young people from entering drug trafficking. Titled LIMIT's, this three-year project (2020-2023) led by the governmental Interministerial Mission for the Prevention of Drugs and Addictive Behaviour (Mission interministérielle de lutte contre les drogues et les conduites addictives, MILDECA) provided support for a whole range of local prevention schemes. In the case of Loos, these included support for parents, awareness activities with primary and secondary school pupils, and the training of prevention professionals. The project is currently being evaluated.
